PREVENT statement

The Prevent duty (section 26) of The Counter-Terrorism and Security Act 2015 came into force on 1st July 2015. This duty places the responsibility on local authorities and schools to have due regard to the need to prevent people from being drawn into terrorism.

Nun Monkton Foundation Primary School is committed to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of all its pupils. We recognise that safeguarding against radicalisation is as important as safeguarding against any other vulnerability.

Operation Encompass

Our school is part of a project that runs jointly between all schools, academies and colleges in North Yorkshire and North Yorkshire Police.

This project, Operation Encompass, has been designed to provide early reporting to schools of any domestic abuse incidents that occur outside of normal school hours and that might have had an impact on a child attending our premises the following day. This information will be shared at the earliest opportunity between Monday to Thursday and, when an incident occurs on a Friday, Saturday or a Sunday, the police will contact us on the following Monday.
